# **CCCSE Launches Three Grant-Funded Projects**

Activities ramp up this spring on new projects focused on dually enrolled students, learning events featuring the importance of the student voice, and focus group work for a statewide success center.

#### Improving Large-Scale Student Engagement Survey for Younger Learners

CCCSE will begin a <u>new project</u> to study dually enrolled students at 15 community colleges across the country over the course of two years. The project will allow CCCSE to amplify the momentum of guided pathways by helping institutional practitioners better understand the experiences of dually enrolled students pursuing pathways to postsecondary credentials. The project will include two administrations of a survey instrument refined for dually enrolled students, data reflection opportunities for participating colleges, and guided action planning for improvement. In the coming months, an advisory committee will be organized to guide the development of the survey, and 15 colleges will be selected to pilot the survey. This project is made possible by a grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

#### **Transformation Enablers Pilot – Pathways Providers**

CCCSE will be the organizer of four learning events this spring for higher education member institutions of Jobs for the Future (JFF) and the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities (APLU). The theme of the webinar series is the student voice. This work is part of the the Pathways Providers grant initiated in summer 2021, which will allow CCCSE to participate, along with other Pathways Service Providers, in a pilot to enhance and build capacity in the guided pathways journey for organizations participating in the Service Design & Delivery (SD&D) ecosystem. This project is made possible by a grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

#### **Ohio Focus Groups and Workshop**

In partnership with the Ohio Student Success Center, CCCSE will conduct and video record focus group interviews with students, faculty, and staff at three Ohio community colleges this spring semester. The purpose of the focus groups is to better understand experiences—especially of Black, Latinx, and indigenous students—on issues of equity, classroom engagement, and career and transfer guidance. Additionally, CCCSE will host a fall 2022 workshop to train institutional research staff on how to use the student engagement data and focus group videos for institutional planning. # **Students Speak About Barriers to Success**

CCCSE has completed the qualitative data collection portion for two ongoing grant projects. Below are selected excerpts from what the students had to say. National reports for both projects will be released in fall 2022.

#### **Students in Need in Community Colleges**

The <u>Students in Need</u> project, co-funded by The Kresge Foundation and ECMC Foundation, explores on a national level the characteristics of students who are food insecure, housing insecure, and homeless, as well as the impact of student need on student engagement. CCCSE conducted interviews in fall 2021 with students at three diverse community college campuses.

I try to eat, definitely, on the days that I come to school, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, but all the time, I don't [eat].

It was a little scary trying to sleep in your car. Not being comfortable, and then making sure you don't hear no noises around you. You don't really get sleep. You half awake. There's nowhere you can really find anywhere to park, especially when you don't know the city or anything like that. It's not like I could park in anybody's driveway or anything like that.

#### Listen to Me: I Have Something Important to Say

The Listen to Me project, funded by Greater Texas Foundation, solicits insights from students about challenges in their early community college experience that may lead to attrition. CCCSE conducted four rounds of focus groups at three Texas community colleges, hearing from the same students throughout fall 2021 and early spring 2022.

I'm really stressed. Whenever I graduated high school, I thought all of the insecurities and everything I was dealin' with would go away, but that didn't happen, obviously. When I'm in class, I tend to compare myself a lot to other people. Whenever I would sit down to study, I would tell myself very negative things. I would be like "You can't even do it. What are you doing?"

Right now at this time, what's causing me the most worry and stress is my financial situation. Not having the money it takes to get here (gas). Not having the money it takes to buy hygiene, clothing, things like that.

I know exactly what classes I should take at what times and so I can graduate on time. ... Makes me feel good. Makes me feel like it's doable and I can see exactly what I need to do in order to achieve my goals.

### Spring Surveys Underway

Currently 197 colleges are participating in <u>CCSSE 2022</u>. Of those, about half have opted to add the free <u>Race/Ethnicity Pilot Survey</u> to their administration. In addition, over a quarter of colleges administering *CCSSE* in the classroom are participating in *CCSSE* paper-and-pencil+, an option that allows colleges to also survey their online-only students. The paper-and-pencil+ option will be available to <u>SENSE</u> colleges starting with the 2022 administration.
