One of the founding principles of CCCSE's work is that the more actively engaged students are with their learning, the more likely they are to succeed. For years, student focus group participants have said that active instructional approaches that encourage engaged learning, such as small-group work and student-led activities, make them more enthusiastic about their classes and more likely to attend and participate. Furthermore, when students can apply what they are learning in the classroom to real-life settings, they are then able to integrate and extend the knowledge they are gaining through their coursework.




Through the following video clips, faculty members express ways in which they make their classrooms engaging learning spaces, and students affirm the value of learning spaces that are engaging.




During the current academic year at this college, how often have you:

- How are we ensuring that all faculty who teach online employ high-impact teaching practices?
- How are we incorporating practices that help students build key skills and develop strong academic habits (e.g., study groups and collaborating with other students)?
- How are we supporting our full-time faculty as well as our part-time faculty to have time and opportunity to engage with students outside of class sessions, whether physical or virtual?


